GARDEN THERAPY - NURTURING WITH NATURE (Report From Georgia Regional Hospital – Winter Bounty)

One of the most enjoyable aspects of living in the South is that you can garden all year round. The residents and patients at GA Regional Hospital make the most of the seasons with their vegetable garden. This winter they harvested their sweet potatoes and radishes and taro root and cooked them in various ways including sweet potato latkes.

Mary Cochran, who is a Smoke Rise Morning Glories member and the Activity Therapy Coordinator at the hospital, noted that the sweet potato crop was smaller than usual this year as something kept eating the leaves on the vines! They have cabbage and herbs and seedlings of broccoli and bok choy ready to be planted for their winter crops. This year they grew cilantro from seed and were surprised at how well that crop did with their other herbs. They have established a work therapy program and one of the resident patients is now being paid to work in the garden several days a week.

The Skilled Nursing Unit that received grants this past year is still a garden "work in progress" to update and brighten the atrium space for the patients who live in that building. Colorful containers and fall plantings have added some life to the space and more is planned in the coming year.

This state managed hospital facility is often trying new techniques and processes to improve the quality of life for the residents, and it is very encouraging to see a positive response from staff and residents. DeKalb Federation is a viable part of the process with this garden therapy as well as the "Drop Your Drawers" underwear and toiletries donations. Thank you for your contributions to such a worthy and caring cause.

The November 5 session was one on Holiday Wreath Making. Using purchased and donated wreath forms, holiday decorations, and other decorative items, club members set up a "pop-up shop" of Christmas decorations for each participating senior center member to "shop" and select a wreath form and decorative items for their wreath. Kathy Williams demonstrated bow-making to the senior members for their holiday wreaths and club members answered questions and provided feedback to the participants and assisted those few senior members with limited fine motor skills.

Due to the overwhelming interest from the senior members, the CGC had to have three consecutive sessions to allow all interested persons to participate in this activity. After the initial 12 registered participants shared their new wreaths with fellow center members, others came to request an opportunity to make a wreath. In turn, that created additional requests to participate. The CGC members allowed additional persons to participate until they ran out of wreath forms. SMOKE RISE MORNING GLORIES DECORATED HISTORIC HOME

For over ten years, the Smoke Rise Morning Glories have decorated the historic Wells-Brown House in Stone Mountain Village for Christmas. The headquarters of the Stone Mountain Historic Society is located on Ridge Avenue and was built in 1870. The construction was unique for the time. In fact, only a few homes in Georgia of that period were built of fireproof concrete cut to look like stone. The house sports a new roof now and is also the location of a DeKalb County Master Gardener project on the grounds of the property.

This year nine club members added period appropriate greenery, fruit and festive red ribbons to the Wells-Brown sign, lamp post, Juliet balcony and front door. On the inside of the home, the club decorated the three mantles and added a beribboned evergreen swag to the stair banister. A few years ago they started the tradition of clove-studded oranges for the mantles for a lovely holiday fragrance. That job is assigned to Marsha Pittard who always adds creative flair to the task.
